THE CONFERENCE

Each year, the IRC hosts Indiana's largest waste reduction educational event, the annual Conference and Trade Show. In 2017, over 200 recycling stakeholders representative of various backgrounds, regions, and interests in waste reduction, gathered at the Indianapolis Marriott East to network, learn, and share resources. The conference featured diverse and engaging breakout sessions, noteworthy keynotes, valuable networking opportunities, and a well-curated trade show. Special thanks to all those who donated to IRC's silent auction.

To kick off the conference, IRC hosted a tour featuring three facilities making strides in waste reduction. The first stop featured Goodwill's new retail outlet and recycling center in Greenwood. Attendees got to see how Goodwill processes all the clothes and household goods when they don't sell. At the second stop, attendees wandered around the expansive campus of the Indy Zoo while an expert guide highlighted their commendable sustainability and conservation efforts. Finally, the last stop featured Ivy Tech Culinary College where they divert 97% of their waste in a closed loop system – from kitchen, to dining hall, to garden.

IRC was thrilled to host the opening night reception at the Art Bank. This uniquely whimsical and inviting gallery features the work of over 20 artists within the quaint rooms and winding aisles of a repurposed 1920s-era bank. Local beer donated by Sun King Brewery, cider donated by Ash and Elm and wine

was accompanied by appetizers donated from local restaurants like the Livery, Goodfella's Pizza, Patachou, Just Pop In and Rooster's Kitchen!

On Tuesday, attendees heard two amazing plenary sessions right off the bat. First, Jerry Powell, editor of Resource Recycling Magazine, drew on his 40 plus years of industry experience with his talk on "National Industry & Policy Trends: Impacts of Elections, Markets, & More!" Then Damon Carson, founder of repurposedMATERIALS, gave a lively presentation about his highly unique reuse company. The keynote address, "Sustainable Packaging Leadership in a Circular Economy – P&G Goals, Progress, & Partnerships," was expertly delivered by Stephen Sikra, a Material Science Engineer with 25 years' experience at P&G.

A few notable break-out sessions included "Business & Bloggers: Zero Waste Trends in Corporate & Community Culture" where we heard from Celia Ristow, a zero waste blogger from Chicago, and from American Licorice Company – Indiana's second zero waste facility. "Creating Healthy Habitats for Humanity: Concepts & Case Studies" engaged districts and green builders alike with presenters from Habitat for Humanity and American Institute of Architects. Lastly, in the "Wine, Dine, & Meet the Triple Bottom Line" session, we heard from charismatic bearded brewers and sustainability gurus about waste reduction initiatives happening at local breweries and restaurants like Sun King, Triton, and Patachou.

America Recycles Day (ARD) is a nationally recognized day dedicated to promoting and celebrating recycling in the United States. Every year on or around November 15 (America Recycles Day), event organizers educate neighbors, friends and colleagues through thousands of recycling themed events. Each year, the IRC promotes ARD to our partners across the state. This year over 18 official events were held throughout Indiana, ranging from plastic bag recycling in LaPorte County to free electronic waste recycling in Warsaw. We are proud of our Hoosier allies who hosted events to collect even non-conventional items like china shards and broken toys. The IRC's annual ARD event is REVENT! Additionally, in 2017 the IRC offered a food waste centered tour of Piazza Produce and Greencycle of Indiana to celebrate.

PROGRAMS

LEND-A-BIN



2017 saw significant growth in the popularity of the Lend-a-Bin Program. Free to IRC members, these ClearStream recycling containers could be seen around the state at a wide variety of events such as Indy VegFest, Irvington Halloween Festival, Greening the Statehouse, and many more! We were excited, too, for new users like Hoosiers for Action, Girls Rock, Indianapolis Zoo AZA Conference, Musical Family Tree, and the Beyond Monumental Marathon. By year's end, IRC helped divert over 12.5K lbs. from approximately 30 events and reached more than 200,000 Hoosiers. Thanks to BioBag for providing compostable bags!





In 2017, IRC again partnered with the 500 Festival to provide comprehensive recycling and composting at two events: the OneAmerica 500 Festival Mini-Marathon and Chase Kids' Day. The goals of this partnership were to provide a highly visible recycling and composting program to capture 40,000 water bottles, 10,000 beer cans and 42,000 bananas at the Mini as well as 1,200 water bottles and all the vendor cardboard at Chase Kids' Day. Altogether, IRC diverted 7,518 lbs. at both events in 2017 - more than ever before! Thanks to all volunteers who made the program possible and to Earth Mama Composting and Greencycle for composting assistance!





In Spring 2017, 320 schools across the nation competed in the 17th annual RecycleMania, a program of Keep America Beautiful. Between the February kickoff and the final recycling weigh-in on April 1, 4.1 million students and staff recycled or composted 69.9 million pounds of would-be-waste, preventing the release of 77,791 metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent into the atmosphere!

IRC thanks the following 8 Indiana colleges for participating in the competition: Ball State University, Butler University, Indiana State University, Indiana University-Bloomington, Ivy Tech Community College-Southwest, Purdue University – West Lafayette, University of Evansville, and University of Southern Indiana. Schools competed in several categories to target materials such as paper, aluminum, plastic bottles, electronics and organics. Updated rankings published online allowed schools to track their progress and rally to improve their standings against rival colleges. Check out how well these Indiana schools performed!

Recycle-Bowl, a program of Keep America Beautiful, celebrated its seventh year as the national recycling competition for K-12 schools. One thousand schools across the U.S. and Canada participated in the competition. This year, Recycle-Bowl saw more than 550K students participate and recycle over 2 million pounds of bottles, paper, cartons, trays, cardboard and food scraps! Thirty-two Indiana schools competed for the title and Bon Air Elementary School in Kokomo, Indiana won the national prize - recycling 8 tons! Way to go, Kokomo! Yet another Kokomo school, Taylor Elementary, won the national title for "Most Improved."

IRC's Student Recycling Leadership Corps (SRLC) program continued in 2017, with the successful graduation of the second group of Student Leaders and enrollment of the third group of for the 2017-2018 program. SRLC aims to increase recycling rates and awareness in schools by implementing public space recycling projects in communities across Indiana and by facilitating PepsiCo Recycling's Recycle Rally program in schools. The goal of the Leadership Corps is to help PepsiCo reach their zero waste to landfill goals through local partnerships while building the next generation of recycling champions. Students accepted into the SRLC complete a one-year commitment during their Junior or Senior year of high school to gain leadership and project management experience and a \$1000 scholarship upon completion of the program.

INDIANA FOOD SCRAP INITIATIVE

Throughout 2017, IFSI, an IRC multi-stakeholder initiative, continued to explore and delve deeper into the issues surrounding food waste in Indiana. In 2017, IFSI hosted four bi-monthly meetings at which we revealed the causes of food waste, barriers to appropriate management, and the myriad of opportunities at every rung of the waste management hierarchy to prevent, reuse, compost, and digest food waste. Notably, Walmart and Meijer presented their food recovery initiatives to stakeholders at IFSI's June meeting. To celebrate America Recycles Day, IFSI also hosted a tour of Piazza Produce, Indy's first zero waste facility, and Greencycle of Indiana, the commercial compost site servicing Central Indiana. 2017 was a year of introspection for IFSI as we re-evaluated how we engage and form our steering committee, began developing a Strategic Plan for Food Recovery in Indiana and created a survey for stakeholders to inform facilitators where to take IFSI next. Through the important dialogue, connections made, and knowledge shared through IFSI, IRC hopes to build a more comprehensive infrastructure to address Indiana's unique food recovery challenges. Thanks to a grant from the Clif Bar Family Foundation received in 2017, IFSI can continue its important role as a convener for food waste stakeholders in 2018.

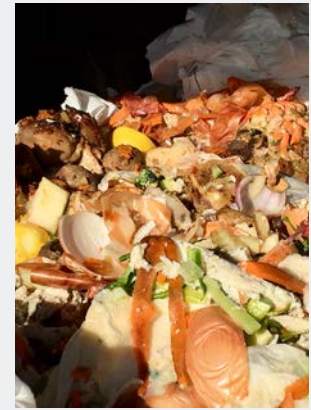

GRANTS



Thanks to a grant from the Indiana Department of Environmental Management Recycling Market Development Program and support from Strategic Materials Inc. (SMI), in 2017, the IRC began the "Glass Isn't Trash" Initiative. The Initiative aims to increase glass recycling in bar and restaurant districts in Central Indiana and improve the quality and quantity of glass headed to Indiana glass container manufacturers who then make new glass containers and fiberglass. Extensive outreach was conducted in Irvington, Ft. Square, Mass Avenue, Ironworks, Broad Ripple, Carmel, and the counties surrounding Indianapolis. IRC produced highly visual and effective branding used in bin stickers, window clings, and educational materials. In Broad Ripple, IRC coordinated securing SMI's existing glass roll off placement, and then redesigning and replacing it. Current and new participants were set up with new bins and materials with the goal of increasing participation and decreasing contamination.



To further our mission of food waste recovery in Indiana, in 2017, the IRC began implementation of the Commercial Food Composting Program, made possible by a grant from the Closed Loop Foundation, with the generous support of the Walmart Foundation. IRC was also fortunate to collaborate and receive support from IUPUI and Butler University, who helped pave the way for this program. The goal of the program is to build up the infrastructure and economies of scale for commercial-scale compost collection in Central Indiana by populating a compost pick-up route serviced by Ray's Trash and Recycling, using Greencycle of Indiana as the commercial compost site. IRC acts as the consultant to each potential participant, providing educational materials (posters, bin stickers, staff trainings, etc.) and a hauling subsidy to ease their transition into composting. In 2017, IRC and key partners laid the complex groundwork of the program and conducted extensive outreach to institutions, hospitals, museums, grocers, catering companies, etc. across Central Indiana. Ivy Tech Culinary College, IUPUI, Butler University, and Marian University are the first participants for 2017, and we are excited to add more in 2018.

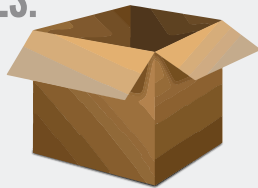
OUTREACH

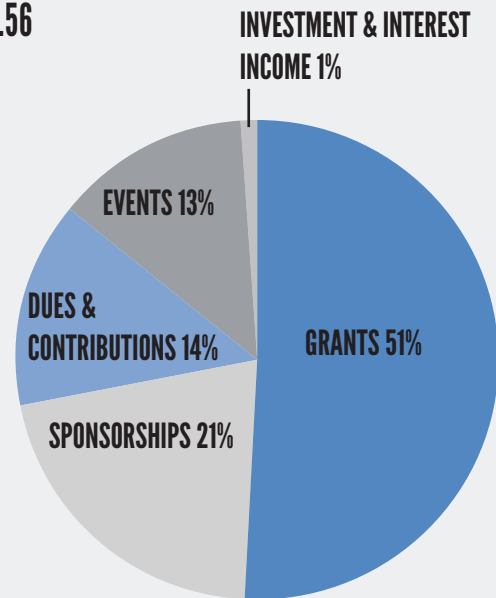

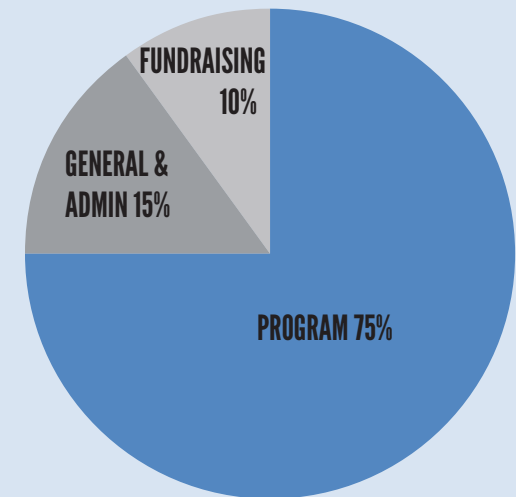
