INDIANA RECYCLING COALITION AWARDED PLANNING GRANT FROM WABASH HEARTLAND INNOVATION NETWORK

INDIANAPOLIS – The Indiana Recycling Coalition (IRC) was selected to receive a Planning Grant from the Wabash Heartland Innovation Network (WHIN) in its first round of funding from the Regional Cultivation Fund. The \$95,100 grant will be used to perform an in-depth inventory of the recycling infrastructure in the 10-county WHIN region, including collection, processing, education, and logistics.

IRC's partners in this project include the Recycling Partnership, the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM), Purdue University's Environmental & Ecological Engineering Department, the Solid Waste Management Districts of Northwest Indiana, West Central Indiana, Tippecanoe County, Warren County, and the Cass County Recycling District.

The IRC-led team will analyze the infrastructure, create models to determine where opportunities for system optimization exist, and perform cost-benefit analyses to rank potential infrastructure and education investments. They will analyze the potential use of smart sensors and IOT-enabled devices to measure and communicate utilization of storage units for maximum system optimization. As a result of this project, they will create a prioritized list of future infrastructure investments, including smart sensors, IOT-enable devices, collection and storage equipment, education campaigns and personnel, that will optimize the collection system. The partners intend to utilize this list to inform a future WHIN RCF Impact Grant proposal with matching funds from various local, state, and national partners.

"The IRC is honored to have been selected for a WHIN Regional Cultivation Fund Planning Grant in this first round" states IRC Executive Director Allyson Mitchell. "We look forward to identifying investment opportunities for maximum system efficiency and creating a model for analysis that we can replicate in other regions of Indiana and beyond."

The purpose of the Regional Cultivation Fund (RCF) is to invest in innovative projects and programs that increase education, vitality and connectivity across the entire region by funding

multi-entity/multi-county opportunities that embed technology into place-making strategies. WHIN will provide counties and communities with the capacity-building support necessary to plan for the sustainability of these projects and programs in order to make the Wabash Heartland a desirable place to live, work and play for years to come.

Over 34 groups submitted Letters of Intent, 17 groups were invited to apply, and 8 projects were selected to receive funding.
